

Lower Rates

- CPCNH is a nonprofit power supplier, actively managing a diverse portfolio of wholesale energy supply contracts.
- By participating freely in competitive power markets, we have an advantage over brokers and utilities who lock in a single hedge for a fixed period.

Consumer Choice

- Community Power is voluntary.
- Customers may opt-in/out/up at any time without charge.
- Community Power provides a menu of clean energy options, often more affordably than utility supply rates.

Local Control

- CPCNH was created by NH cities, towns, and counties. Our meetings, records, and finances are open to the public.
- ✓ Our purpose is public good. Our Board is composed of community representatives.
- Net revenues from power sales accrue in reserve funds for community benefit.
- ✓ Public Advocacy in the Regulatory and Legislative process promoting Community energy needs

Clean Energy

- CPCNH enables cities and towns to develop local clean energy and battery storage projects to create local economic benefit.
- ✓ We empower Members to speak with one voice at the State House and PUC to lead public advocacy reforms that enable clean energy market innovation.

Bring a Plan to Town Meeting

Launch!

- □ 1. Join Coalition "Joint Powers Agency" Governed by Members
 - Membership by Select Board vote to adopt Joint Powers Agreement (JPA)
- 2. Establish an "Electric Aggregation Committee" (EAC) to;
 - Prepare an "Electric Aggregation Plan" (EAP);
 - Hold two public hearings on that EAP in advance of;
 - Bringing the EAP to Town Meeting for voter adoption;
- 3. Launch Community Power!
 - Town Meeting adoption of an EAP authorizes (but does not require) the Select Board to contract for services to finance, launch, and operate Community Power.



[†]CPCNH's Granite Basic is a savings of 24% off Unitil's residential/small commercial rate, 20% off NH Electric Co-op's, 17% off Liberty's, and 2% off Eversource's. The small discount compared to Eversource's rate is because Eversource Default Energy Service customers benefit from a 1.5 ¢ per kWh credit due to an over collection of rates last year (a prior year reconciliation). The Coalition is able to beat this artificially low rate for all NH residential & many; small commercial ratepayers while covering all of our costs and accumulating financial reserves on behalf of our operating Member CPAs.

Public Advocacy

- Empowering Member cities and towns to speak with one voice at the Legislature and Public Utilities
 Commission
- ✓ Coalition Membership approves our Regulatory & Legislative Affairs Charter and "policy principles"
 - Increasing innovation through local control, equity & community development
 - Advancing community benefits through open access to the electric system
 - Enforcement of laws, market rules, and regulations



Operational Challenges & Opportunities

- ✓ Utility operational barriers exist that prevent CPCNH's programs from fully serving all customers, despite regulatory rules and NH Law
 - This has led to some unfortunate situations where utilities did not flag NEM customers for us, and as a result, were inadvertently enrolled into CPA service and customers lost their credits.
 - CPCNH has filed complaints against Eversource with PUC and DOE in addition to working to find settlement with the utilities on an individual customer basis.
- ★ Because utilities are unable to share the required NEM export data, CPCNH is not able to serve most NEM customers
 - We can serve most NEM 1.0 customers without harm!
- ✓ We are further held back due to the inability of utilities to treat exports to the grid by our customers as "load reducers" as required by law (RSA 362-A:9, II) and Puc 2205.15
 - We are working with utilities and regulators to achieve resolution.
- ✓ Unlocking the value stack as referenced in the DOE VDER study and explained in our Docket 22-060 is essential for innovative rates and competition
 - The LEEPA pilots envisioned in RSA 362-A:2-b explain how retail customers can directly receive the benefit from transmission cost reduction, unlocking rate innovation like Transactive Energy.
